Course Description:

English 8 is intended to be a challenging, highly interactive course which focuses on increasing students' skills in analyzing literature and substantiating those discoveries through written and verbal communication. Students will discover their own voice and writing style as together we explore themes of discrimination, social justice, and the American Dream. As the end of English 8 approaches, students will have gained a better understanding of their own beliefs and values, applied that knowledge to their reading and research, and demonstrated improved ability to defend their beliefs. Naturally, both vocabulary and grammar will be an integral part of class and homework time, and gains in those areas will be demonstrated through class discussion and writing. This course is a required course designed specifically to help students prepare for success as they enter the Upper School the next year.
