Department: Visual Art **Course Name:** Foundations in Art

Course Description:

This semester course is designed for 9th and 10th grade students. Foundations builds on concepts and skills that have been introduced in the middle school art classes. The course gives students an opportunity to experience the variety of media we offer while continuing to develop their skills and vocabulary before moving on to the variety of specialized classes offered in our upper school fine art curriculum. Projects will include traditional wet and dry materials as well as an introduction to ceramics and digital photography!

Although studio production is an important component of this course, students will also take time to explore application techniques and processes. Learning how to think critically and analyze work will be another important component of this course.

For 9th and 10th grade students this course is a prerequisite for all other for visual art classes

Prepare and submit work for displays, exhibits and juried shows Recognize strengths and weaknesses in their work as well as the work of their peers through the process of critique and written evaluation
