Course Name: Latin 1A

Course Description:

This course establishes the fundamentals for continued success in Latin. Strong emphasis is placed on developing a foundational Latin vocabulary and learning English derivatives. Basic elements of Latin grammar are also introduced. Using a textbook with a reading-based approach to Latin, students develop proficiency in comprehending and translating simple Latin passages. The course also offers an overview of Roman geography, civilization, and mythology.
