**Department:** World Languages **Course Name:** French III

# **Course Description:**

This course is designed for students of the third year of Upper School French. It is a course that requires an intensive review of grammar and vocabulary of the first two years of the language, and it is an introduction of more complicated, intermediate structures that will enhance an overall study of the target language at this level. The students will begin to learn the three modes of communication---interpersonal, interpretive and presentational---as defined in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Standards for World Languages as they apply to the "5 C's:" 1) Communication, 2) Community, 3) Comparison, 4) Connections, and 5) Culture. The students study the following themes: feelings and life, city living, the influence of the media, the value of ideas, and society in evolution. This course is taught in accordance with ACTFL's proficiency guidelines, with the focus on the francophone world. As well as regular assignments in our text, the students are exposed to longer, more complicated reading assignments in selections of authentic literature, magazine articles, videos on different aspects of francophone culture and history, short stories, etc. In this way, the students can learn more quickly and build a mastery of active, appropriate vocabulary based on context. Prerequisite: A minimum final grade of 75% in French II and/or departmental approval.
