Course Description:

The Honors Spanish IV course is an advanced treatment of Spanish available to selected students who intend to continue their Spanish study through the AP Spanish Language and Culture course the following year. It serves as both an introduction to college-level Spanish and a prerequisite for the Advanced Placement Spanish Language course. Students in Honors Spanish begin to use their language skills in more sophisticated areas as they explore literary and cultural topics, but they also devote time to basic vocabulary building and to the study of structural topics. This course is conducted entirely in Spanish. Prerequisites: 87% or better in Spanish III and/or departmental approval with a demonstrated motivation for language learning
