**Course Name:** Ancient Civilizations

**Course Description:**

This course explores the concept of civilization from the emergence of agriculture through the fall of the Roman Empire. It takes a global perspective, exploring the ancient cultures of Mesopotamia, Egypt, Phoenicia, Israel, Greece, Rome, India, China, and Mesoamerica. Students will explore each culture through its artifacts, architecture, language, and literature. The course will continue to strengthen historical skills including use of maps, research, and primary source analysis, and seeks to establish connections of understanding between ancient civilizations and societies today.
