Course Description:

This course is an advanced treatment of French available to selected students after three years of study. It serves as both an introduction to college-level French and as a prerequisite to the AP French Language course. Students in Honors French IV review and refine grammar concepts and begin to work with advanced reading selections of authentic literature. This course emphasizes sustained oral expression, well-controlled writing, and the sharpening of listening skills. Students are encouraged to incorporate vocabulary, idioms, and grammar concepts into their writing and speaking. Cultural awareness is strongly emphasized. The course is conducted entirely in French. A minimum grade of B+ in French III and/or the recommendation of the teacher is required for entrance into this course.
